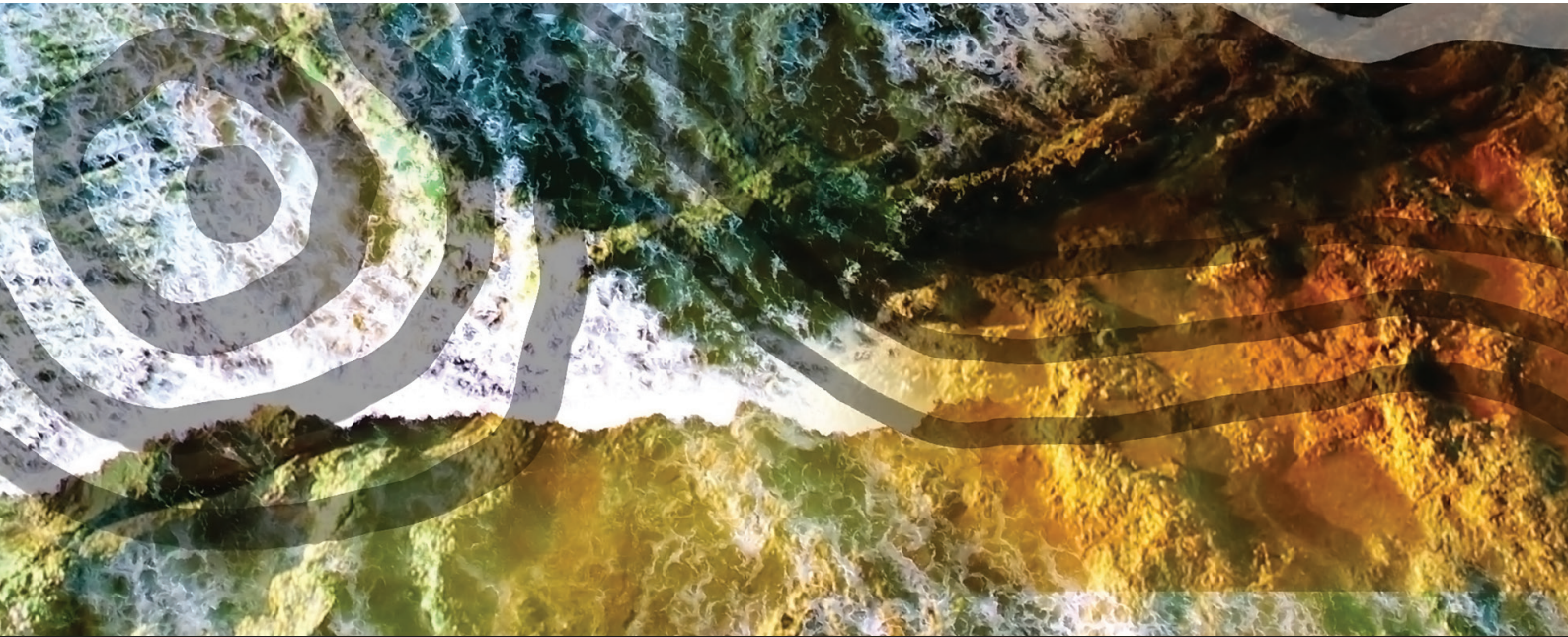

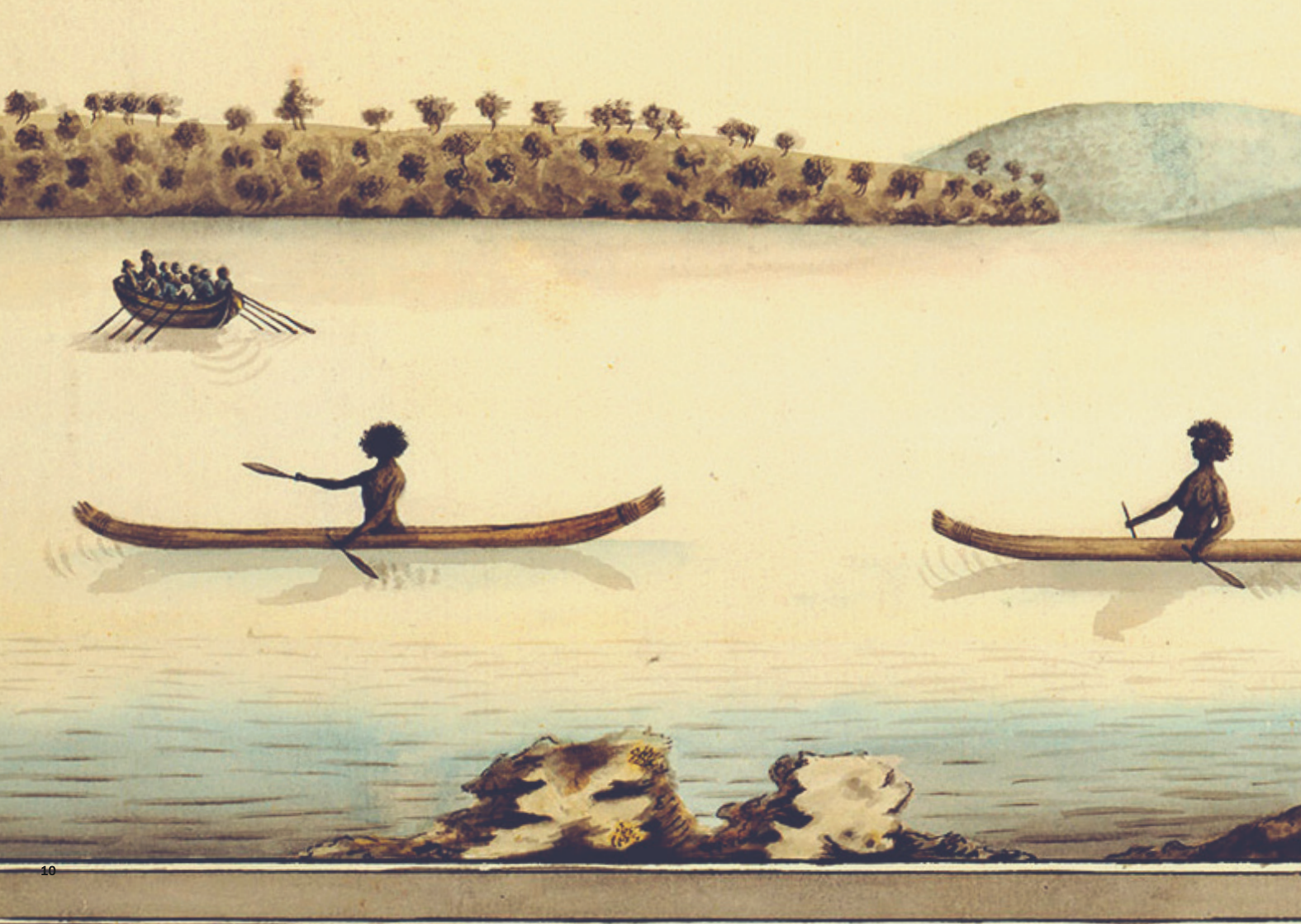


Image: Detail from 'Port Jackson Painter' Watercolour, Watling Drawing - No. 40, Natural History Museum, London

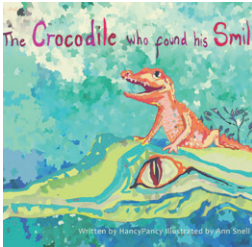

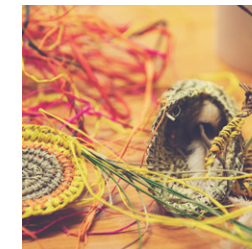

as a rite of passage. Through this 45-minute telling we learn the true story of the Garden of Eden, a tale of patriarchal propaganda and feminine strength. This telling will be accompanied by a recorded sound track also created by Travis de Vries.

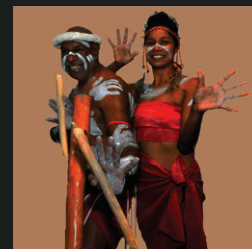
